A-G GPA Calculation



- ★ Your grade point average (GPA) is a numerical summary of your grades from high school.
- ★ It is used to determine class rank and universities use rank and GPA to compare you to other applicants.
- ★ It qualifies you for the Cal Grant and merit scholarship!
- ★ UC's and CSU's only look at the A-G courses taken in 10th and 11th grade to calculate the GPA for admissions.
- ★ Approved AP/Honors course work is weighted (given an extra point) for a maximum of 8 semesters.

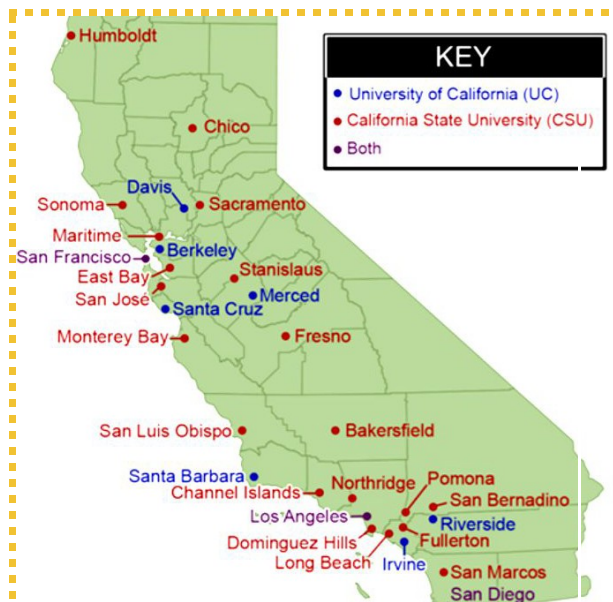

How to Register for the SAT & ACT

If you don't have one already, create two separate accounts with College Board & ACT. Be sure to use an email you check often, and write down your Username and Password. Once you have your login information, you are ready to register! **DO NOT CREATE DUPLICATE ACCOUNTS!**

Begin your registration (sat.org/register & act.org) and complete the steps online:

- 1) *Update Personal Information:* This is where you fill out personal information about you, your parents, and your school. *Not all information is required. You can choose “I do not wish to answer”*
- 2) *Create Student Profile:* Most of this information is not required to register for your SAT and ACT exam. However, for the **SAT**, filling out the subsections (GPA, Coursework, Activities, etc.) will provide you with information about scholarships and schools and are relevant to your answers.
- 3) *Your Test Selection:* Choose the Test Date and Test Option. For the **SAT**, you will choose the School Site you would like to take your test at. For the **ACT**, you will use your zip code to find the closest test center you want to attend; however, this will be later in the registration process.
- 4) *Upload a Photo:* Take a photo using your laptop, cell phone, or camera. Make sure that they fulfil the requirements (think of it like a driver’s license photo). When you are satisfied with the photo and it fulfills the requirements, upload it!
- 5) *Your High School Courses & Grades:* For the **ACT**, you must select the courses you have taken/plan to take. You may skip the portion asking what grades you received.
- 6) *Score Report Choice:* For the **ACT**, select the colleges you would like to receive your scores. *If you are interested in UC’s and/or Cal States, select only one UC and one CSU.* For the **SAT**, you will have to send your test score through another process.
- 7) *Submit:* Review your information for accuracy and make any payments. Check your email to make sure you receive a confirmation of your registration.

4 Systems of Higher Education in California

There are 4 different types of colleges/universities in California. Each school system has unique programs and different emphasis in the classroom. We want to make sure that you find a school that's best for your learning styles and your career goals! All 4 systems have tons to offer. Remember, there is no such thing as a best school – just the best school for you!



University of California (UC)

★ 10 campuses that grant Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctoral degrees. Mainly research based education.

★ **Minimum "a-g" GPA:** 3.00

★ **Admissions Process:** GPA and SAT/ACT test scores are most important for admission, but a comprehensive review considers other factors such as extra-curricular involvement, personal qualities of the applicant, and significant improvement.

★ **Tuition cost:** \$13,900 per year

★ **Stand Out Programs:** Biological & Life Sciences, Environmental Studies, Engineering & Computer Science, Ethnic Studies, Social Sciences, Language & Literature, Humanities, Math & Physical Sciences

California State University (CSU)

★ 23 campuses that grant Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctoral degrees. Hands on education.

★ **Minimum "a-g" GPA:** 2.00

★ **Admissions Process:** Only GPA and SAT/ACT test scores are considered during admissions.

★ **Tuition cost:** \$5,742 per year

★ **Stand Out Programs:** Journalism, Criminal Justice, Nursing, Kinesiology, Speech Pathology, Music/Audio Recording, Animation/Game Development, Interior & Fashion Design, Social Work, Business, Accounting



Private Colleges & Universities



★ 72 accredited degree-granting non-profit independent colleges serve California. Many campuses are small, religiously affiliated universities. They operate individually!

★ **Minimum "a-g" GPA:** varies by campus

★ **Admissions Process:** varies by campus

★ **Tuition cost:** \$30,000 - \$50,000

★ **Stand Out Attractions:** Prestige, Staff to Student Ratio, Unique Programs, Scholarships Awards, Women's Colleges, Religious Affiliation

California Community Colleges

★ 114 colleges that grant certificates, Associates degrees, and limited Bachelor's degrees, as well as provide transferable lower-division coursework to 4-year universities. UC offers a Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG Agreement) at 6 campuses (excluding UCLA, UCB and UCSD).

★ **Minimum "a-g" GPA:** No minimum GPA

★ **Admissions Process:** Open enrollment allows any student 18+ to attend.

★ **Tuition cost:** \$46 per unit

★ **Stand Out Attractions:** Automotive/Aircraft Technology, Cosmetology & Barbering, Fire Technology, Police Academy, Culinary Arts, Dental & Nursing Assistant



Differences in Teaching & Career Goals

Each school system caters to various learning styles and operates with different career and goals in mind.

University of California (UC)

Teaching Orientation: Develop academic and scientific research skills. Emphasis on theoretical and analytical learning

Post-Degree Expectations: Assume graduates will pursue higher degree beyond a Bachelor's.

Degrees/Credentials Offered: Degrees are research based. Minimal professional training.

California State University (CSU)

Teaching Orientation: Practical based instruction with career orientation. Theory and research included but not emphasized

Post-Degree Expectations: Assume graduates will enter the workforce in non-research oriented careers

Degrees/Credentials Offered: Degrees provide professional training

Community College (CC)

Teaching Orientation: Educates California's first-responders, provides job training and industrial skills, and is a pathway to a Bachelor's degree.

Post-Degree Expectations: Students enter the workforce or transfer to a 4-year college.

Degrees/Credentials Offered: Degrees and certificates offered in various fields
